(Abstract: The principles of the Phaedo cannot be
subjected to any third man attack. Hence, the
Parmenides contains no attack, effective or other-
wise, upon the Phaedo's theory of forms.)

1:30 pm: "Properties and Causes in Sir Isaac Newton," John
F. McDonald, Indiana University at Bloomington.
(Abstract: Newton's "hard line" regarding hypo-
theses is clarified by his distinction between
"cause" hypotheses, dealing with the source or essence
of things, and "property" hypotheses, dealing with
statements supported by empirical sources).

2:30 pm: Brief business meeting

3:00 pm: (immediately following business meeting):
"Nominalism - Realism in the Tractatus Reconsidered,"
John Riteris, Indiana University-Purdue University
at Indianapolis. (Abstract: Some critics claim
the Tractarian objects are particulars; others say
they are both particulars and properties. The reason
neither model fits is due to Wittgenstein's confusion
of ontological analysis, aiming at categorical simples,
with part-whole analysis, aiming at absolute simples.)
